
BOOSTED AGAIN FOR \$11,500

REAL ESTATE CITY HELPS TO **BOOST RECORDS**

Harrisburg Among 76 Municipalities of Nation Quoted For Figures

While Harrisburg is included among the seventy-six "largest" cities of the United States in the compilation of the February building records in the current issue of the "American Contractor," the municipality gets a place in the loss column.

February, 1915, according to the "Contractor's" figures, the amount expended for operations here was \$38,-425, while in February, 1916, the total was only \$31,460, a falling off of 18 per cent.

Harrisburg together with the other seventy-five cities boosted the total expenditure during February last for building operations to the unprecedented sum of \$53,219,098. The increase over the same month of last year was 20 per cent. as during February, 1915, the operations cost but \$44,280,506.

New York city of course leads all the other cities of the country with an enxpenditure in buildings of \$10,344,-482. Chicago follows with\$7,354,200; Boston is next with \$4,591,000; Detroit and Philadelphia spent \$2,186,960 and \$2,437,750 respectively; while among those which spent more than a million are the following:

Baltimore, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, San Francisco and Washington.


