The Trapshooters and Rifle League of the Philadelphia division, Pennsylvania railroad, was perfected last night with an enrollment of 60 members. As soon as a favorable answer has been received application will be made to the United States government for rifles and ammunition.

L. Watson; treasurer, I. D. Jenkins; executive officer, J. G. Kepling. These officials will constitute the executive committee for transaction of business during the interim between regular meetings.
