TELEGRAPH TEAM AFTER ROSEWOOD

Manager Thomas Issues Challenge; Puts Up Cash and Names Teams

Due to criticism for playing the Rosewood basketball team in a championship series, Manager Charles W. Thomas, of the Harrisburg Telegraph team, is out with an explanation and challenge.

"We will play Rosewood on the Chestnut street auditorium floor for \$100 a side, winner to take all money over expenses. Game to be refereed by President Sheffer of the Eastern League, or a man from his staff selected by him, preferably Herman Baetzel, the recognized peer of referees.

"Each team to furnish half the necessary money to cover expenses when arrangements are complete, said money to be returned if receipts equal expenses. Each team to have the privilege of choosing Eastern League or Collegiate rules to govern one-half, toss of coin to decide first choice.

"The teams to be selected from the following players: Rosewood, Kent, Krout, Kline, Tittle, Killinger, Devine, Ziegler, and Manager Killinger; Telegraph, Stackpole, Gebhard, Yoder, Barr, Roth, Edmunds, Storey and Manager Thomas.

"Captain Stackpole has consented to play only because he is an employee of the Telegraph, as he has made it a rule to play only for the pleasure he derives from the game."

"The cash is up and will be turned over to the Sporting Editor of a neutral paper as soon as the Rosewood management is heard from.

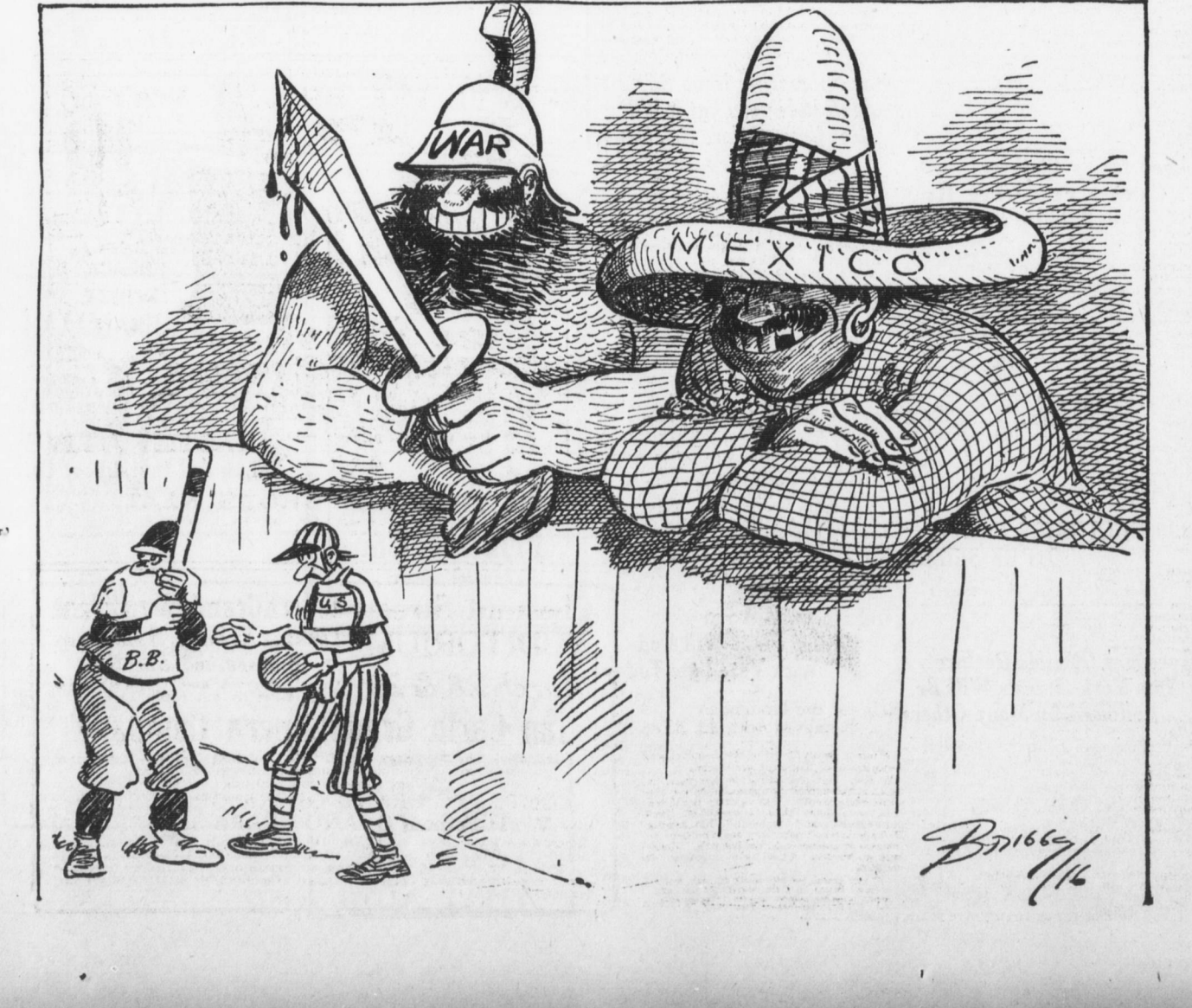
