THE SENATE BILL. It provides that military instructors be supplied by the War Department with an available student body of 100 or more and where a military course satisfactory to the War Department is established. A sufficient number of graduates would be designated for six months' additional training with the regular army to maintain a corps of 50,000 reserve officers.

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
