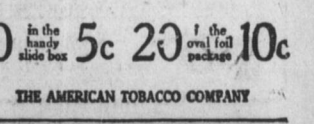
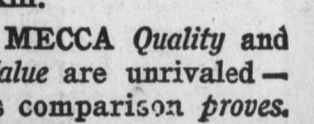
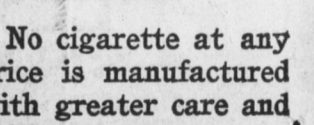
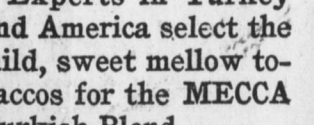
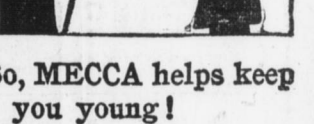
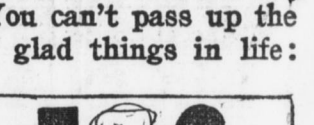
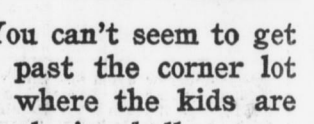
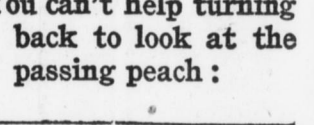
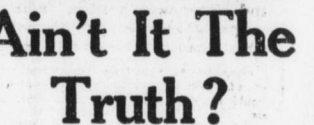
The game at Chestnut Street Auditorium Saturday night between the Harrisburg Independents and Camden, Penn., was a very successful one.
