Texas Methodists Develop New Plan of Evangelism

"One Thousand Revivals, Led by One Thousand Preachers, Simultaneously in 1,000 Churches"

By The Religious Rambler. Unreported in even the religious press, and unsuspected by the public, there is abroad in the land an intense discussion of recent developments in the field of professional evangelism.

a fixed compensation, determined in advance by the churches.

In the meantime, into a field of heated discussion, anxious questionings and fearful solicitude, the Methodists of Texas have precipitated on a large scale, a method of evangelism that holds promise of large results; and may be the way out for the future.

This is similar to the Simultaneous Preaching Mission which the Episcopal Churches all over the land have been using. Local congregations in many places have adopted it: the First Presbyterian Church of Houston, Texas, is taking in six hundred new members this year by the "win one" idea.

But it has been left for the six annual conferences of the Methodist Church in Texas and New Mexico to adopt the scheme on a large scale, and to systematize it effectively and bring it to a climax. April 16 is "Decision Day" with the Texas Methodists, and the following Sunday, which is Easter, is set for the great ingathering.

Publicity, with its telling slogans, plays a considerable part in this latest evangelistic movement, though it lacks the personal flavor of the write-ups of professional evangelists. Thus "the goal" of the Texas campaign has been widely advertised as "One Thousand Revivals Conducted by One Thousand Preachers Simultaneously in One Thousand Churches and One Thousand Decision Day Services on Sunday, April 16, and One Thousand Big Classes Received into the Church on Easter, April 23, 1916."

Because the Methodist ecclesiastical machinery is well adapted to producing concerted activity within a specified time in behalf of any given cause, it has been possible to organize and drill the huge force of Methodism in Texas for this evangelistic objective.

Putting it Up to the Preacher. One common complaint against evangelistic meetings is that they idolize the evangelist, who is a bird of passage, and that church members are led to make invidious comparisons between him and the local pastor. Some evangelists make more converts for themselves than they do for the Church.

In order to link up the results of

evangelistic meetings with the Church, as well as to put all the work upon the whole church membership, this "Win One" plan has been devised. Instead of a short, swift campaign of fervor, this method makes the pastor a leader in a well-organized and sustained and systematic effort to enlist the entire working force of a congregation in the effort to convert their own neighbors and relatives and to enroll them as members of the local church. Better a revival with fifty converts who become working members of the church than one with five hundred converts not a tenth of whom can be found six months after the meetings are over.

"Efficiency" is written large over the Texas plan. It was organized last Summer at a meeting in Dallas, by Rev. Glenn Flynn, of Beaumont, and was followed by preliminary meetings for organization in September and December, and a notable "Inspiration meeting" at the beginning of March in Dallas. In addition to the General Committee, a publicity committee, with W. C. Everett, of Dallas, as chairman, was named, and a finance and programme committee also, with O. F. Sensabaugh, as chairman. A special department for the campaign was opened in the Texas Christian Advocate.

With the Printer's Help. A literary propaganda was instituted among the churches in preparation for the April climax. A "Worker's Library" was compiled, for the use of preachers and laity. This was chosen with regard to the denomination of the authors. The list is of interest to church people, and I print it here: "The Ministry of Intercession, Andrew Murray; Autobiography, Chas. G. Finney; Evangelism Exemplified, Luther E. Todd; The Price of Power, Holden; The Passion for Men, Hallenbeck; Taking Men Alive, Chas. G. Trumbull; Pastoral and Personal Evangelism, Chas. L. Goodell; The Child for Christ, A. H. McKinney; How to Bring Men to Christ, R. A. Torrey; Everyday Evangelism, Wm. Leete; The Soul-Winning Church, L. G. Broughton."

Laying the Lines. After the bishops and presiding elders had given their endorsement to the project, and it had been learned that the churches were sympathetic, a schedule like this was laid down: All the preachers' meetings engaged to give the "Win One" campaign right of way. January was set apart for special preparation by the preachers. February was made the month for organizing the laymen and setting up efficiency and increased attendance campaigns in the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues. A religious census of the community was included. A special drive was to be made for church letters which newcomers had failed to present. April 16 was set apart as "Decision Day" and "Go to Church Sunday."

Reports indicate that in the more than a thousand churches affected there already has been a great stimulus of interest. Church members get farther by having something to do than by merely being preached at. The enlistment of workers has been no small task, but it has already been equivalent to a revival for many congregations.

The conviction that a church and a

pastor are fully competent to conduct their own evangelistic meetings is perhaps the greatest contribution of all. If the Texas meetings this month bring forth the expected results, it is inevitable that the plan will spread to all denominations and to the whole country.

For two things are assured: The Church is newly aroused to the importance of evangelism. And, equally, the Church is disinterested with present methods of professional evangelism. Perhaps the lone star has led the way out--THE RELIGIOUS RAMBLER.
