F. C. Jones, aged 24 years, of 413 Reily street, brakeman, employed in the Harrisburg yards of the Pennsylvania railroad, was found unconscious early this morning along the tracks near Maclay street. He died on his way to the Harrisburg Hospital. Jones had a fracture dskull and contusions on the right side of the body. Coroner Jacob Eckinger is investigating the accident.
