NOMINATIONS IN LAST HOUR RUSH

Holding Back Has Complicated Matters and There Will Be Trouble at Finish

The final day for filing nominating petitions at the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth for the May primary started with a rush at 7 o'clock this morning when several hundred pieces of mail which had accumulated over night and a number of persons who had brought petitions here on night trains arrived at the Capitol about the same time.

The petition to place the name of Governor Brumbaugh on the presidential ballot and the petition for the Brumbaugh delegates-at-large and alternates-at-large which were filed last night, were added to during the morning, thousands of additional names being filed.

The Washington and Socialist parties' State tickets were filed last night with many other papers.

It is expected that the rush will keep up until late to-night. The office will close at midnight.
