Syracuse, Sicily, April 19.—Lieutenant Fikentscher, of the famous German raider Emden, has made his escape from Malta, whither he had been taken as a prisoner by the British. The lieutenant is now a prisoner here.

"I will commit suicide rather than return to the hands of the British," the lieutenant said. He maintains that as Germany is not at war with Italy, the Italian authorities cannot surrender him to the British.
