WEDNESDAY EVENING.

Deputy Attorney General Keller Elucidates Some Questions Raised

Under an opinion handed down by William H. Keller, First Deputy Attor-ncy General, the restrictions placed on the State Highway Department relative to the use of State-aid money are still further strengthened. The Atstill further strengthened. The Attornev General's office previously had given an opinion that State-aid funds could not be used on the construction of State highways in boroughs. First Deputy Attorney General Keller in his second opinion tells State Highway Commissioner Cunningham that this restriction applies also to the use of State-aid money, in townships and that it is not legal for him to use these funds in the construction of State highways in townships.

This decision prevents the awarding of two contracts which the State Highway Department had agreed to enter into this year; one in Armstrong county on the road from Ford City to Kittanning and the other in Clarion county through Clarion and Paint townships.

ways and that State-aid money must be used on roads other than State highways.

In another opinion the First Deputy Attorney General tells State Highway Commissioner Cunningham that under the Act of June 5, 1913, county commissioners and township supervisors are permitted to contribute a portion of the money to be used in the improvement of State highways, this meaning, of course, that the State's share of the funds needed for such improvement will be paid out of State highway funds.


