Disregards Protest

Notwithstanding protest of our government, the imperial German government at once proceeded to carry out the policy it had announced. It expressed the hope that the dangers involved, at any rate the dangers to neutral vessels, would be reduced to a minimum by the instructions which it had issued to its submarine commanders and assured the government of the United States that it would take every possible precaution both to respect the rights of neutrals and to safeguard the lives of non-combatants.

Recites Happenings

What has actually happened in the year which has since elapsed has shown that these hopes were not justified, those assurances inexecutable of being fulfilled. In pursuance of the policy of submarine warfare against the commerce of its adversaries this government has attacked merchant ships with greater and greater activity, not only upon the high seas surrounding Great Britain and Ireland but wherever they could be counter them, in a way that has grown more and more ruthless, more and more indiscriminate, as the months have gone by, less and less observant of restraints of any kind and having delivered their attacks without compunction against vessels of every nationality and belligerent upon every sort of errand.

Tragedy Follows Tragedy

Vessels of neutral ownership, even vessels of neutral ownership bound from neutral port to neutral port, have been destroyed along with vessels of belligerent ownership in constantly increasing numbers. Some times the merchantman attacked has been warned and summoned to surrender before being fired on or torpedoed; sometimes crews have been rescued and been vouchsafed the poor security of being allowed to take to the ship's boats before she was sent to the bottom. But again and again no warning has been given, and the ships of the ship's boats allowed to those on board. What this government foresees must happen has happened. Tragedy has followed tragedy in such rapid succession, with such terrible circumstances, as to make it grossly evident that warfare of such a sort, if warfare it be, cannot be carried on without the most palpable violation of the dictates alike of rights and humanity.

"Whatever the disposition and intention of the imperial German government it is manifestly proved impossible for it to keep such methods of attack upon the commerce of its enemies within the bounds set by either the reason or the heart of mankind." The imperial German government informed this government and the other neutral governments of the world that it has reason to believe that the government of Great Britain had armed all merchant vessels of British ownership and had given them secret orders to attack any submarine of the enemy they might encounter upon the high seas. It would hardly be possible for the imperial German government to justify in the circumstances of belligerent ownership as auxiliary vessels of war, but it is not possible to justify the destruction of such vessels without warning. The law of nations has long recognized the right of merchantmen to carry arms for protection and to use them to repel attack, but it is not possible to justify the Imperial German government's claim that it set these understandings aside in circumstances which it deemed extraordinary. Even the terms in which it announced its purpose thus still further to relax the restraints it had previously professed its willingness and desire to put upon the operations of its submarines carried the plain implication that at least the vessels which were not armed would still be exempt from destruction without warning and that personal safety would be accorded the passengers and crews; but even that limitation it has in fact constituted no check at all upon the destruction of ships of every sort.

"Again and again the Imperial German government has given this government its solemn assurances that at least passenger ships would not be thus dealt with, and yet it has again and again permitted its undersea commanders to disregard these assurances with entire impunity. Great liners like the Lusitania and the Arabic and mere freight boats like the Sussex have been attacked without a moment's warning some time before they had even become aware that they were in the presence of an armed vessel of the enemy and the lives of non-combatant passengers and crews, have been sacrificed wholesale, in a manner which the government of the United States cannot regard as wanton and without the slightest color of justification. No limit of any kind has in fact been set to the indiscriminate pursuit and destruction of merchantmen of all kinds and nationalities within the waters, constantly extending in area where these operations have been carried on, and the roll of Americans who have lost their lives on ships thus attacked and destroyed has grown month by month until the toll has mounted into the hundreds.

All sober-minded men must unite in hoping that the Imperial German Government, which has in other circumstances stood as the champion of all that we are now contending for in the interest of humanity, may recognize the justice of our demands and meet them in the spirit in which they are made.

Women in Galleries

Representatives of the allied countries filled the diplomatic galleries of the House. Women ruled in the public galleries, less than twenty men finding places in the six hundred seats. Mrs. Wilson was in the executive party.

Speaks Slow and Distinct

The President began his address speaking slowly and distinctly. His voice was heard throughout the chamber.

Tense Silence

When he pronounced the words of the ultimatum declaring that unless Germany should immediately declare and effect an abandonment of indiscriminate submarine warfare this government would have no choice but to sever diplomatic relations, there was no demonstration, only a tense silence and a reflection of the gravity of his words.

War May Follow

The President consults Congress at this stage, it was pointed out, because, while he has the authority to break off diplomatic relations, Congress alone has power to declare war, and there is only one instance in modern history where a break in diplomatic relations between two first-class powers has not been followed by war. It is the situation between Germany and Italy.

Wall Street Accepts Latest Developments With Much Misgiving

New York, April 19.—Wall Street accepted latest developments in the German controversy with misgiving, judging from the weak tone of the stock market's opening today.

WOMAN WINS A PARDON OF STATE

Mrs. Derby Argues Case and Gets Decision Before Board Leaves Bench

Mrs. Elizabeth Derby, representing some religious and charitable organizations in Philadelphia and one of the few women to appear before the State Board of Pardons, to-day won a recommendation for pardon for Charles Miller, Chester county, convicted of forgery. Miller was twice refused pardon, but Mrs. Derby secured a rehearing for him and to-day presented a plea for pardon. She contended that there had been a mistake in identification and after considerable discussion was informed by Secretary Governor McClain that she could inform Miller that the board would recommend a pardon.

Colonel Asserts Wilson Is Shirking in Laying Crisis Before Congress

Oyster Bay, N. Y., April 19.—Colonel Roosevelt believes that President Wilson is failing to perform his duties of leadership in calling a joint session of Congress to lay before them the issues of the submarine controversy with Germany. He feels that the President is shirking his responsibilities and that, furthermore, he has only himself to blame for the position in which the nation now finds itself.

Oddly enough, most of the would-be new citizens of the United States were Austrians; one was Greek, one was a Canadian—but there was not a single German in all that big crowd.

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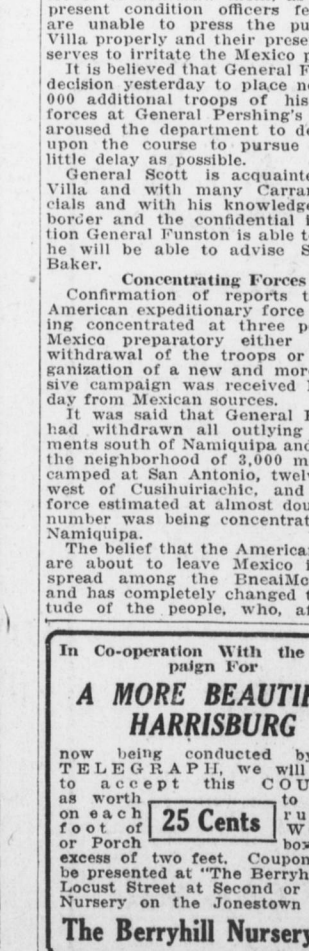
