PHILA. ELECTRIC CONTRACT O'K'D

Service Commission Closes Consideration at 1 O'clock This Morning



The Public Service Commission at 1 o'clock this morning closed its consideration of the proposed new schedule of rates of the Philadelphia Electric Company, the biggest case that ever came before it and one which has occupied over a year and a half.

The commissioners spent most of yesterday considering the subject, the differences of opinion which had been rumored not being apparent when the decision was announced. The action of the commission was to approve the municipal contract under which the city of Philadelphia will save \$150,000 this year and also obtain a refund of \$150,000 for 1915 and to permit the company to file a new schedule of commercial and domestic rates which it is stipulated will be effective as of April 1 and which it is estimated by the experts will save the consumers \$900,000 this year and probably \$1,250,000 next year as against the former rates.

The case has involved the expenditure of thousands of dollars and attracted national attention.

Members of the commission declined to discuss the matter to-day and no further statement was made beyond the order.

Track Approved.—The Public Service Commission has approved the additional track for the Pennsylvania railroad over the city.

Rabies Quarantines.—The State Live-stock Sanitary Board to-day established quarantines for rabies in Erie and Easton, cities, and North Girard, borough.

Attended Anniversary.—Adjutant General Stewart attended the First Regiment celebration in Philadelphia last night.

Good Peach Crop.—The State Department of Agriculture bulletin announces that there are signs of an excellent peach crop in the eastern part of the State.

Member Here.—Representative F. E. Geiser, of Easton, was at the Capitol in a Pardon Board case.

Agreement Made.—Referee E. K. Saylor, of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau, has been notified by the insurance carrier of the Schmidt Baking Company, of Harrisburg, that an agreement, under the terms of the compensation act, has been made with Henry Parsons, of 346 South Cameron street, who filed a claim petition for compensation as a result of an injury received while at work. Compensation is being paid Parsons and consequently the hearing, scheduled for this afternoon, in the Workmen's Compensation Board rooms, Masonic Temple, will not be held.

Big Hearing Fixed.—The Industrial Board of the Department of Labor and Industry will hold a public hearing in the House chamber at the Capitol on Tuesday morning, May 2, for the consideration of questions relating to the operation of the boiler code, recently adopted and effective July 1. Many inquiries have been received by the Industrial Board from casualty insurance companies and manufacturers of boilers of various types on certain regulations of the code. It is expected that representatives of boiler plants from all sections of the State will attend the hearing.

Ex-Member Here.—Representative W. F. Elmer, of Greensburg, was at the State Capitol to-day.

Cases Go Over.—The Public Service Commission has continued the South Mountain electric railway case against the Perry county jury case. The members adjourned to-day until Monday.

Mr. Williamson Here.—Attorney R. W. Williamson, of Huntingdon, a candidate for Congress in the Seventh district, was at the Capitol to-day.

Ask Early Decision.—Representatives of the Trainmen were at the Capitol to-day to ask an early decision in the full crew cases. Argument was heard Tuesday.

Respite Granted.—Governor Brumbaugh to-day granted a respite of the executive of Gaspar Marturan and Thomas Chickarelli, Cambria, until the week of May 29. The men were under sentence of death this week, but their cases were held over by the Board of Pardons yesterday.

Protests Filed.—The Wilkes-Barre Railways Company to-day filed protests against issuance of certificates of convenience to every operator of a jitney who has filed an application with the Public Service Commission. The commission has listed 28 applicants from Luzerne and Lackawanna counties for hearing next week. The complaints against jitneys operating illegally will be heard later.

D. A. R. Balloting on Editor of Magazine

A. R. magazine. A rebuttal was made necessary by a failure of choice yesterday. Other officers were elected.

The contest for editor is between Miss Eliza G. Denison, of Pennsylvania, and Mrs. Amos G. Draper, of the District of Columbia, and that for honorary vice-president-general between Mrs. John Newman Carey, of Indiana, and Mrs. James Ross Mellen, of Pennsylvania.

COUNCIL TO CONSIDER TREASURY AUDIT TO-NIGHT

City Council will meet behind closed doors this evening to consider the seven bids that have been received for auditing the books and accounts of the city treasury for the ten years prior to January 1, 1915, and to suggest a new method of bookkeeping.

The proposals will all be carefully considered so the recommendation as to the award may be submitted to Council at its regular meeting next Tuesday.

STATE SUES FOR GOOD ROAD FUNDS

Action Started Against Townships and County to Recover Nearly \$16,000



Suit was begun to-day by the State to recover nearly \$16,000 from Great Bend township, Susquehanna county, Snow Shoe township, Center county, and Washington county for their respective shares of the cost of road building in these districts by the State.

Two demands are made upon William Newman, J. A. Mayo and William Bend, one for \$5,553, another for \$4,650; one is against Rush Quick, M. B. Conway and George N. Witherite, supporters of Snow Shoe, for \$4,059, and the remaining action is against Washington county to recover \$688. The State built sections of road through these districts with the usual understanding that the county pay a quarter of the cost while the townships have paid their shares.
