Depositors Were His Friends, Lorimer Says

Chicago, Ill., April 21.—Ninety-five per cent of the depositors of the LaSalle Street Trust and savings bank were political supporters and personal friends of William Lorimer, according to testimony he gave at his trial yesterday on charges of conspiracy in connection with the bank's failure.
"My friends were the ones who were hurt," he testified. "They stood behind me and kept the bank going."
Lorimer said he spent every cent he could get in his fight to retain his seat in the United States Senate and as a result found himself deeply in debt, even as to minor household expenses.
Former Senator said he paid a milk bill of \$502.88 only after bankruptcy proceedings had been threatened against him. He asserted he still owed household accounts of five years' standing.

MORE MEN AND MARINES IN NAVY
House Bill Provides 17,000 Increase, Munition Plant and New Officers' Grade

Washington, April 21.—Substantial increases in the fighting personnel of the navy are made in the naval appropriation bill as determined upon by the naval House subcommittee. The full committee will meet next Thursday to take up the bill as now drafted and to pass on the building program. The bill increases the enlisted force by between 13,000 and 14,000 and the marines by 3,000.
A new provision is incorporated for a medical corps of 2,500 to 2,600 men and for a general reorganization of the marine corps, with one major-general commanding and three brigade-generals and for a marine reserve. There is a considerable increase in the number of generals, with thirty-five or forty gunnery sergeants. Civilians are authorized to be appointed from technical schools for service as engineers, as recommended by the Secretary of the Navy.
An appropriation of \$1,500,000 is made for erection of a naval munitions plant, expected by the committee to cost ultimately between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000. This is distinct from the general army factory project. Some committee members declare they will support all provisions that will help put the United States navy in the world's second rank. Advocates of such a navy and Congress should act immediately.
