MARKET SHRINKS AFTER HOLIDAY

War Group and Mexicans Show Weakness; Situation Responsible
By Associated Press
New York, April 22.—Resumption of trading after the holiday was attended by further shrinkage of values, the war group and Mexicans displaying marked weakness. Indications that Germany may delay her reply to the recent note from Washington were accepted with misgivings. In the course of the first fifteen minutes there were declines of two to five points in Crucible Steel, Studebaker, General Electric, Vestinghouse, Baldwin Locomotive and Industrial Alcohol, while Mexican Petroleum, American Smelting and Copper, and American Steel and Wire were lower by two to almost three points. U. S. Steel and the investment division were heavy. Marines were firm and active.
