LANCASTER'S MEN TURN TO HUGHES

Congressman Griest Says to Be as Favorable Toward Jus- tice as in 1912

It is generally understood that Congressman W. W. Griest and his district colleague in the Republican national convention will favor Governor Brumbaugh in the preliminary balloting and then line up with the Hughes supporters. Congressman Griest was for Hughes four years ago and believes to-day that he is the most available Republican in the contest for the Presidency.

It is certain, however, that there will be no effort in the convention to ignore the Roosevelt sentiment in Pennsylvania. If it appears to the potential leaders that Republicans of this State really want the colonel, it is believed that both the Penrose and Brumbaugh forces as well will fall into line for the ex-President. Many of Governor Brumbaugh's warmest supporters are strong for Roosevelt and the developments of the next two or three weeks will determine the position of Pennsylvania at Chicago.

In some quarters it is thought there will be little factional disturbance in the delegation.

As a matter of fact, most Republicans outside of Philadelphia and perhaps Pittsburgh are out of sympathy with the factional warfare. This applies equally to both sides. There is also a pronounced feeling among many stalwarts against any attempted humiliation of Governor Brumbaugh at Chicago.

Owing to the fact that the farmers will be extremely busy about the time of the May primaries a large vote is hardly to be expected and the big cities will have to do most of the fighting. Incidentally, there is a strong undercurrent of sentiment among Republicans against any factional activities which may leave scars that will be hard to heal in the general election.







GEORGE A. WERNER ISSUES LETTER STATING PLATFORM

George A. Werner, school director, candidate for the Legislature, to-day issued the following letter:

"To my Republican friends: I have been placed before you as a candidate for the nomination for the office of representative in the Legislature from the first district by the filing of a largely-signed petition of enrolled Republicans, who are acquainted with me and believe in the principles for which I stand.
