LEAGUE ACTIVITY STIRS LOCAL FANS

Promoters Here For Conference With Manager; Local Players Start Next Week

With the near approach for starting preliminary practice and activity on the part of Leo Groome and Manager George Cockill, baseball fans are showing old-time baseball spirit.

Plains will be completed for sending the Harrisburg squad to Bucknell next week for practice. To-day's program called for a conference between Manager Cockill and a number of players.

Leo Groome, the Harrisburg backer, and Abraham Rosenbluth owner of the Reading Club came to the city late yesterday afternoon and met Manager George W. Heckert of York.

It is probable that Manager Ramsey will be identified with the Reading team. He is very enthusiastic over the prospects for the season and said: "This is the season for baseball and I am anxious to get back into the game."

Speaking of conditions in the State League, Mr. Rosenbluth said: "I am more than pleased with the outlook. We have been up against some snags but so far have overcome all obstacles. We will get started on May 10. Territory is not lacking and should any team fail to materialize at the meeting in Reading May 4, there will be no difficulty in filling the vacancy. As the league will have protection, there have been hundreds of applications received from players, and it looks like a fast game. Mr. Bloom added: "It is my intention to give Harrisburg the best possible in baseball and with that end in view Manager Cockill and myself will sign up a bunch of good men and fast youngsters. The league will have protection. That is an important factor. Once the players start work all doubts as to what is going to happen will be removed. It has not been an easy task to organize a baseball league."

The Tech, Harrisburg Academy dual regatta at Princeton on April 29, between the varsity eights of Harvard and Princeton, the time of the winning Princeton crew was announced as 9 minutes, 12 1/2 seconds. It is now stated that this is a full minute short of the actual time of the race.

The various shooting grounds on the outskirts of the city will again be closed to-morrow with beginning of the Tech, Harrisburg Academy and Pennsylvania Railroad shooters will be out. Now they are a scarce article.

Mr. Groome takes everything cool, and he will spring something soon that will stand the Atlantic League backers on their heads.

STANFORD STARTS CAMPAIGN

Palo Alto, Cal., April 28.—A campaign to raise \$7,000 to send the varsity crew and track team East this year was begun yesterday by Stanford University student officials. Each of approximately 2,000 students will be asked for \$2 and alumni are co-operating.

The fund is to defray the expenses of the crew which will enter the Poughkeepsie regatta next June, and to finance the trip of the track team to the intercollegiate athletic meet, to be held in the Harvard Stadium.
