Brethren in Christ Intended Holding Conference in Canada This Summer

CROSS ROADS SELECTED

Mount Joy, Pa., April 29.—Brethren in Christ denomination will hold its national conference at the Cross Roads Church, one mile west of Mount Joy, to open Monday, May 15, and continue a week. It was to be held in Canada this year and it was only last week that the change was made. The railroads selling tickets into Canada told the church people of the possible trouble they might have to contend with in getting across the border into Canada, as well as in returning to the United States, on account of the European war, in which Canada takes an important part. Nevertheless, the church decided to take the risk and hold the conference across the border in Canada, but recently the Mennonites held a conference in Canada, when a mob attacked them, and some of them almost lost their lives. It was then decided to hold the conference in the United States this year.
