PAY TRIBUTE TO LOCAL COMPOSER

Carlisle Choral Society Honors Its Conductor of the Past Ten Years

Frederic C. Martin, director of the Carlisle Choral Society for the past ten years, will receive a well-merited tribute Saturday, May 13, from musicians of Central Pennsylvania, particularly of Carlisle.

At this time the May festival will be held, with the Philadelphia orchestra playing. In the afternoon the orchestra, under the direction of Leopold Stokowski, will give a concert including a Brahms symphony, while Professor Martin will direct the orchestra for one of his own compositions, a concerto in A, with Newell Albright, of this city, at the piano.

In the evening the great chorus of 140 voices will sing, with the orchestra accompanying, Mr. Martin's first mass in D, which is written along the lines of the impressive Beethoven and Liszt work. It is scored for an orchestra of 70 pieces and is one of the most pretentious compositions ever written by a Pennsylvania composer.

The Saturday night concert will conclude with "The Crusaders," by Gude. Some of the most prominent musicians of Carlisle, who have had the gratification of helping the organization until it is almost self-sustaining.

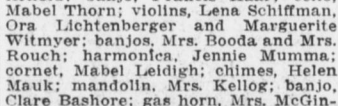
