In the lunch hour cases it was held by the board in one that where an employe not actually engaged in the furtherance of employer's business it must be shown that injury was due either to condition of premises or conduct of employer's business and in another that compensation could not be allowed where employe was not required to be on premises. It has also been held that an employe is not entitled to compensation for an injury which is slow in development, such as paralysis due to long inhalation of acid fumes. Such injury is an occupational disease.

It was held in another case that a person engaged by a number of different employers to scrape walls prior to paper hanging is performing part of regular business of an employer in course of such work and is not an independent contractor. The fact that he was paid by the plece and that he supplied his own tools does not affect his status.
