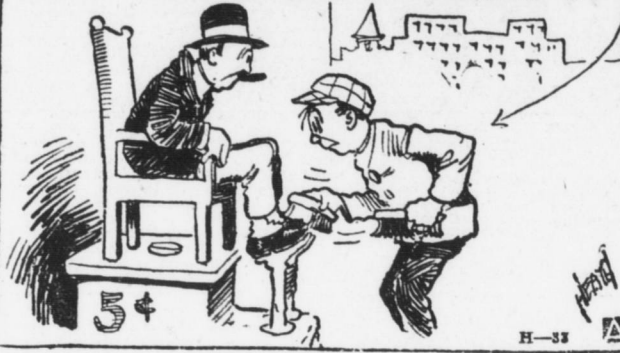

Text of Short, Sharp Word of Warning Sent to Germany by Washington

Washington, D. C., May 9.—The note of the Imperial German government, under the date of May 4, 1916, has received careful consideration by the government of the United States.

Throughout the months which have elapsed since the imperial government announced on February 4, 1915, its submarine policy...

The government of the United States feels it necessary to state that it takes it for granted that the Imperial German government does not intend to imply that the maintenance of its newly announced policy is in any way contingent upon the course or result of diplomatic negotiations.

In order, however, to avoid any possible misunderstanding, the government of the United States notifies the Imperial government that it cannot for a moment entertain much less discuss, a suggestion that respect by German naval authorities for the rights of citizens of the United States upon the high seas should in any way or in the slightest degree be made contingent upon the conduct of any other government affecting the rights of neutrals and non-combatants.

been compelled to boost the price of men considerably in order to get enough men to overcome the serious handicap of inclement and unseasonable weather.

City department officials, heads of the outdoor departments of the traction company and even the construction superintendents of the railroads make pretty nearly the same complaint.

Rites For Shovels

The fact that many of the foreigners—whose labor could easily be had for sixteen and two-thirds to seventeen and a half cents an hour—have gone back to their home countries to exchange a pick and shovel for a rifle in the trenches, is responsible for much of the shortage.

Lack of sufficient labor however, has affected various big jobs on the city's Spring improvement schedule, thus: Up until this week the Central Construction and Supply Company had been unable to organize a large enough force to start the new paving operations in Bellevue park.

Where Work Is Delayed

Work on the river park slopes, on the construction of the new flights of steps to the wall, on the planting, in the parkway and in Wildwood has not progressed as rapidly as it might have, had the park officials not been confronted with the problem of insufficient workmen.

On the Cameron parkway lack of men is the chief obstacle. Commissioner W. H. Lynch, superintendent of streets and public improvements, is up against a similar condition.

Before the end of this week the Harrisburg Railway Company expects to start its end of the new paving work in North Second street from Schuykill to Seneca.

A gang of thirty-five or forty men has been able to muster thus far for the street repair work. At that however, the work has progressed rapidly. More than 5,000 yards have already been laid. Third street has been placed in splendid condition and the gangs have crossed over Maclay street and are now coming down Sixth.
