50c 50c LONG TRAINS ARE SAFE AND CHEAP

RAILROAD NEWS

Railway Gazette Points Out Disadvantages of Shorter Movements

"Reduction of the length of freight trains would be a long step backward in respect of the two most important elements of efficient railroad operation -economy and safety," says the Rail-way Age Gazette in an analysis of an exhaustive bulletin just issued by the Bureau of Railway Economics, which presents the arguments for and against legislation limiting the length of freight trains.

a cara a The brotherhoods of railway train service employes have been trying energetically to secure such legislation in the various States as a substitute for the so-called "full crew" laws on the ground that shorter trains would pro-mote safety. They are now suggesting a reduction in the length of trains in order to increase the speed of the trains and reduce the working day of train crews. "The bulletin shows clearly," the

Gazette says, "that the increases in the average length of trains, which have

average length of trains, which have been the most marked feature of rail-road operation within recent years, have contributed greatly toward mak-in railway service both more eco-nomical and more safe. Employes Favor Short Trains The train service employes concede that, with terminals the distance apart they are now, it would be impossible to get many freight trains over the road within the limits of an eight-hour day without reducing their loads. "But to reduce the loads would be to make it necessary to run more trains and this would have the same effect in increasing the density of freight trains, and thereby augment-ing the number of accidents and the Bureau of Railway operation, which the Bureau of Railway peration would have. The average number of cars per

that train limit legislation would have. The average number of cars per freight train increased from 26.8 cars in 1904 to 34.3 cars in 1914, or 28 per cent, while the average capacity of freight cars increased from 30 to 39 tons and the average load of each car increased from 17.7 tons to 21.1 tons. Consequently the average load per freight train increased nearly 50 per cent, from 307.8 tons in 1904 to 451.8 tons in 1914."


