Degrees For W. E. Mickey and Marcel Von Bereghy

Annville, Pa., May 25.—The class of 1916 at Lebanon Valley College has included in its number two well-known former Harrisburg athletes who will receive the degree of bachelor of arts at the fiftieth annual commencement exercises to be held the first part of the month of June. Marcel von Bereghy and William E. Mickey, the former an alumnus of Harrisburg Tech and the later a member of the 1911 class at Harrisburg Central, have the distinction of being elected captain of the track teams at both high school and college.

Von Bereghy was a member of the football eleven during the past four years and also a track man during the same period. For two years he held the intercollegiate record in the shot put and was also a point winner in the discus and hammer throws. After graduation Von Bereghy will assume charge of a coaching position in a southern college.

Mickey has played a guard position on the varsity football team for three years and was a member of the track team for the past four years. He was also a member of the championship relay team of 1914, which won first place at the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival in that year. Mickey will continue his academic work and will enter Harvard the coming Fall as a student in the graduate school of business administration.

Suit Goes to Court to Test Liquor Shipping Law

Special to the Telegraph. Lewistown, Pa., May 25.—A hearing to be had before Magistrate Van Natta, in the case of J. E. Watts, local agent for the Adams Express Company, has been waived for court at the instance of the officials of the company. Watts, stands charged with having furnished express packages containing intoxicants to persons of intemperate habits, known as habitual drunkards. The suit was brought by Constable Leonard Saxton, of this place. This is dry territory and much liquor is shipped in here from many sections of the country and the suit has been brought for the purpose of testing the law.

Building Bridge Across Juniata River at Mt. Union

Mt. Union, Pa., May 25.—The Aetna Powder Company has just brought here 50 carpenters from New York City, who will be paid 50 cents per hour and will do special work in building a bridge across the Juniata river, which will be used by the East Broad Top Railroad to get coal into the plant and as a means for the men from Mt. Union to get to the plant.

TEST CLAIM OF 30 YEARS AGO

C. LaRue Munson Figures in Unique Suit in Local Courts



For the first time in the history of the Dauphin County Courts, proceedings were begun to-day to legalize thirty-year-old judgment claims amounting to close to \$15,000, when C. LaRue Munson and Robert H. Munson, executors for the estate of Edgar Munson, Williamsport, started an action to receive the judgments for these sums filed against N. C. Freck and Co., Millersburg. Attorney J. Clarence Funk represents the Messrs. Munson. The actual claims amount to something under \$8,000, and they were filed in 1882. The interest charges have nearly doubled the original sum. According to the law, which is being tested now for the first time in this county, if no claim for unpaid judgment is made within twenty years, the burden rests upon the plaintiff to prove his claims. Exonerate Civic Club. — At its meeting yesterday the County Commissioners decided to exonerate the Civic Club new quarters, at Front and North streets, from county taxation. The city authorities will probably follow suit. Charges False Arrest. — Alleging that he was arrested and locked up in jail for fifty days on a trumped-up charge, of which he was never guilty, because he wouldn't pay \$35, Steve Mandie to-day began a \$1,000 slander suit for damages against Simo Jozovae. Fix Date For Tie Decisions. — The County Commissioners to-morrow will fix the dates for drawing the straws to settle the dozen or more tie votes for primaries. All the election returns were sealed away to-day in the new steel ballot boxes.

BIBLE CONFERENCE OPENS TOMORROW

Strong Men Will Address Students of Scriptures in First Baptist Church

Beginning with to-morrow and continuing until May 30 in the First Baptist Church, Second and Pine streets, Harrisburg, a Bible Conference will be held under the auspices of the Monthly Bible Conference Association, founded October 1913.

One of the teachers of the conference will be the Rev. George E. Guille. A minister of the Gospel who had resigned his pastorate to give his entire time to a Bible teaching ministry. A man of rare teaching ability, author of Bible study booklets, among them "Isaac and Rebecca" and "The Judgment Seat of Christ; extension lecturer of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.

The Rev. Guille has been here before and made a lasting impression on all who heard him. The Rev. Guille will speak as follows:

Friday afternoon, "The Salvation of Believers"; Friday evening, "The Position of Believers"; Saturday evening, "The Sonship of Believers"; Sunday afternoon, 3.30 o'clock, "The Reward of Believers"; Monday evening, "The Priesthood of Believers"; Tuesday afternoon, "The Bridehood of Believers." Another of the conference teachers will be the Rev. William L. Pettinell, editor of Serving and Waiting, dean of the Philadelphia School of the Bible, and author of several books on Bible exposition. Mr. Pettinell has a vigorous but gracious method of teaching the Word of God, that makes a deep impression on his hearers. The Rev. Pettinell will speak as follows: Saturday afternoon, "The Mystery of Godliness"; Sunday morning, 10.30 o'clock, "Jesus Christ Our Hope"; Sunday evening, 7.30 o'clock, "The End of the Age"; Monday afternoon, "The Wise and Foolish Virgins"; Tuesday evening, "The Eminence of the Lord's Return."

All these sessions to be held in the First Baptist Church, Second and Pine streets. Bring your Bible and note book.
