ARTIST TEACHER IN CONSERVATORY SENIORS WORKING ON THEIR PARTS

Charles Mackey, Brilliant Pianist of City, Is Leaving For Indiana



Charles Mackey, a brilliant young pianist of the city, leaves here early in June for Indiana to become a senior member of the faculty of the Indianapolis Conservatory of Music. The school has an enrollment of 600 and there are twelve teachers in the piano department alone. Mr. Mackey's position is that of "artist-teacher" which includes thirty or forty public appearances a year. Mr. Mackey was organist of the Messiah Lutheran Church several years ago before going abroad to study, and since his return has been organist of the Derry Street United Brethren Church. He studied in Europe under the greatest masters, Lhi-vigne, Lietsch, Fiedler and Hutcheon, all of whom gave him strong encouragement in his plans for a musical career. To-morrow evening as his last appearance as organist of the Derry Street Church, Mr. Mackey will play a brief organ recital, the program including "Menuet Symphonique" ("Salamo"), "Intermezzo" (Hollins), "Gavotte" (Thomas) and "Berceuse" (Salamo).
