## Auto Fans Pouring Into Indianapolis For Races

Indianapolis, Ind., May 29. — The annual flood of automobile race fans was pouring into Indianapolis to-day from every direction. The sixth annual running of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway to-morrow is the attraction. Twenty-one and possibly more drivers are expected to start the 300-mile contest.

If it is cool and calm to-morrow a record-breaking performance is anticipated. Ralph De Palma's average of 59 miles an hour, the record established last year, was made under nearly perfect conditions. As the field of starters is fast and the race has been cut from 600 to 300 miles, it is considered probable that his speed will be surpassed in 1916 race.

## TECH IS SECOND IN LEHIGH MEET

Only Ten Points Behind Philadelphia Central; Houtz Wins Two Events

With Philadelphia Central high school athletes to contend with, Tech high on Saturday came off with second honors in the Lehigh University track meet held at Bethlehem on Saturday. Philadelphia, with college advantages for training and six-year courses, won the meet with a total of 29 points to Tech's 22. The Harrisburg athletes were closely followed by Bethlehem Prep.

Washington Central high landed in fifth place with 13 points. Steelton High had 7 1/2 points; Haverford school, 6; Harrisburg Central and Williamsport high each 4; Easton high and Washington Tech, each 2.

In this meet there were seventeen high schools entered, with more than 200 athletes. Fifty-two silver cups went to the winners in each event, while Philadelphia Central high received 5 handsome silver loving cups, which it will hold for one year.

Sutch, Demming, Eyster, Evans, Harris, Haehnel and Moore, were Tech winners; Houtz won the points for Central and Sellers was the Steelton star.
