## FERTILIZER LAW BEING ENFORCED

### State Brings a Number of Suits to Punish Men Who Do Not Register

Secretary of Agriculture Charles E. Patton to-day ordered fifty-three prosecutions for violations of the State fertilizer law. Eight of the cases were for selling fertilizers that did not meet the manufacturers guarantee upon analysis, and forty-five for selling fertilizers that were not registered. The prosecutions are scattered throughout the following counties: Below guarantee — Beaver, Bucks, 4; Schuylkill, Berks and Union. Not registered — Columbia, 5; Butler, York, 6; Chester, 2; Lycoming, 2; Susquehanna, Lebanon, Lancaster, 3; Lackawanna, Franklin, Juniata, Westmoreland, 2; Schuylkill, 4; Snyder, Warren, Bedford, Northampton, 2; Bucks, Cumberland, Adams, Perry, Somerset, Center, 2; Berks, Northumberland and Blair. The large number of prosecutions for non-registration resulted in a change of practice by the Department of Agriculture. Heretofore when such brands were found the Department sent notices to the parties responsible for their sale. It was apparent that this courtesy was abused and led to carelessness on the part of the shipper. It is hoped that this change will obviate this practice. All dealers are warned against selling, offering or exposing for sale any fertilizer upon which all of the requirements of the fertilizer laws were not complied with. Where dealers have ignored these notices and aided in evading the law, actions will be brought against them rather than against the manufacturer. Fertilizers to be legally sold in Pennsylvania must be registered with the Department of Agriculture before they are sold, offered or exposed for sale. Indianapolis.—William Devine, a farm laborer, explained in the criminal court that, being unable to collect \$3 from James Boyce, leaving near Flackville, he took four suits of clothes as payment. ## COMPENSATION RULINGS GIVEN

### Question of a Wife Who Leaves Her Husband and Casual Employment Up

The State Workmen's Compensation Board has issued a decision ordering a rehearing in the compensation claim of Sheridan N. Marsh, of Bangor, against Frank and Ida Groner, of Bangor, in which the question of a husband acting as agent of a wife in having a residence remodeled is involved. Marsh was employed to do plastering and fell from a scaffold. The referee decided that the claimant was not entitled to compensation as his employment was "casual in nature and not in the regular course of the business of the employer." The opinion by Harry A. Mackey, chairman of the board holds that the policy of the law is against the creation of any situation whereby a workman can be engaged in his occupation and be deprived of the benefits of the compensation act. The chairman also says that the question of casual employment also entered into the case and that it had better be heard again from the start. Chairman Mackey has also given an opinion affirming the decision of Referee Saylor in the case of John Thomas Keats against the Wallis Coal Co., of Harrisburg, in which it was claimed that Keats was not entitled to compensation because he had been dismissed from employment. The man understood he was to return to work and was hurt when he resumed his work.
