

GIRL BORN A MUTE
IS TAUGHT TO SING

Columbus, Ohio, June 3.—Teaching a deaf mute to sing, a feat which hitherto generally has been considered impossible, has been accomplished by Mrs. Christian Born, wife of a Columbus brewer, after weeks of experimenting with Magdalene Sattler, an 18-year-old Cleveland student at the State School for the Deaf here. Miss Helen Keller, of New York, the eminent deaf and bilm student, is in Columbus for the purpose of testing Mrs. Born's new process. Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, also is interested in Mrs. Born's experiments.

The new teaching method consists of factal expressions accompanied by plano tones, which the student cannot hear. To date the Cleveland girl has mastered more than an octave of notes, enough, scientists say, to prove that the new method is a success.
