RAILROAD NEWS

TRAINMEN STAND WITH PRESIDENT

Endorse Lee's Action in Reinstatement of Local Members; Re-elect Officers

Special to the Telegraph. Detroit, Mich., June 8.—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen in convention yesterday unanimously endorsed the ruling of President William G. Lee, in ordering the reinstatement of Milton T. Robinson, Samuel H. Derick and Frank B. Huber, of Harrisburg. These members were expelled by the respective judges following charges made by William H. Pierce, leader of a railroad strike in this city two years ago. Pierce charged that the members being reinstated were guilty of being unfair and intimidating other members in violation of their oath and obligations.

The three members appealed to President Lee and were reinstated. In his report to the convention President Lee gave a history of the strike and the charges against the Harrisburgers. The unanimous endorsement of his action followed and was received with prolonged cheers. The three members were re-elected with the exception of Vice-President Whitney, who was defeated by Sines. The longest convention in the history of the Brotherhood of Trainmen is expected to close Monday unless the committee on resolutions start something.

Fix Date For Big Picnic For Pennsylvania Veterans

The big reunion and basket picnic of the veteran employees of the Philadelphia division, Pennsylvania Railroad, will be held at Mt. Gretna Thursday, July 27. Two special trains will leave Harrisburg on that date at 8:15 in the morning. It is probable the Enola Band of forty pieces will furnish music during the day. Superintendent William B. McCabe, of the Philadelphia division, president of the association, yesterday appointed Charles T. Jones general chairman of the committee on entertainment. He will name his assistants and will co-operate with the members of the executive committee. He will outline his program early next week.

Railroad Notes

The Pennsylvania Railroad will run two excursions from Harrisburg to Toolechester Beach, June 29 and July 9. Veteran employees of the Baltimore division of the Pennsylvania Railroad met in Baltimore yesterday. It is estimated that 6,000 carloads of dirt will be necessary to fill in the restle work of Philadelphia and Reading Railway at Catawissa. Work on the seven new tracks in the railroad yards at Rutherford is again under way. Bad weather interfered with the starting of this improvement which will be rushed to completion because of need for more room. The Reading Railway relief station, for March 1916, received \$25,742.12 and expenses, \$32,558.13. Within the next month 60,000 tons of steel cars will be shipped from Philadelphia to France. An order for 1,000 steel cars has been placed by the Russian Government with the Seattle Car & Foundry Company. The new equipment will be used in transporting troops and supplies.

READING PLANS IMPROVEMENTS

The Philadelphia and Reading Railway Company announce plans for extensive improvements along the Wilmington and northern branch between Reading and Coatesville. A new bridge will be erected at Modena to take the place of one recently destroyed by the ice. The bridge at that place will also be enlarged permitting the handling of 1,000 more cars. Other new bridges are also included in the plans.

VETERAN TREASURER RETIRES

Special to the Telegraph. New York, June 8.—J. V. McNeal will retire from the position of fourth vice-president and treasurer of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad June 30. It was announced yesterday after 32 years of continuous service with that company in various capacities. E. M. Devereaux, assistant treasurer and transfer agent in this city, will succeed Mr. McNeal as treasurer, and R. B. Luckey will take the place made vacant by Mr. Devereaux.
