Mr. and Mrs. Robert Reed Entertain at Dinner

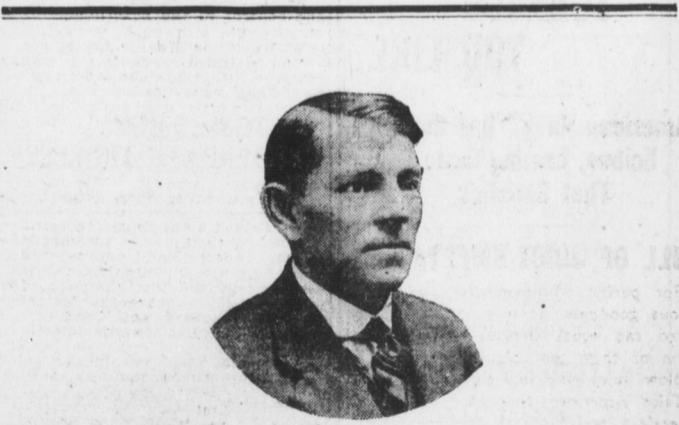
