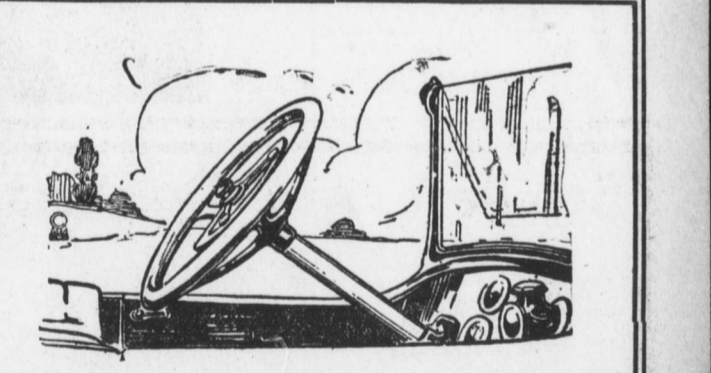
CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND.
