Bandit in Bank Hold-up Shoots Fighting Teller

Clearfield, Pa., June 10.—A man wearing a mask and with face blackened and carrying two loaded revolvers entered the Curwensville National Bank and attempted a holdup after Wild West formula yesterday noon. He succeeded in getting behind the counter and pointed a gun at Teller H. M. Hoover.

Cashier Anthony Hile got to him first and they grappled, with Hoover jumped in, and the robber tore loose and shot Hoover through the mouth. He then ran from the bank and down the street toward the Pennsylvania Railroad station.

By this time a score of persons, among them Chief of Police Clark, were after him hot foot, Clark shooting as he ran.

At the station Deputy Sheriff Chaplin, of Clearfield, was waiting for a train, about due, when he saw the chase and ordered the robber to stop, emphasizing his command with his gun. Clark yelled that he would plug him quick unless his hands went up, and Chaplin covered the man while Clark took away his guns.

Taken to the local prison, the prisoner was found to be H. L. Downings, formerly of Tyrone, now living near Johnstown. He has a number of relatives in Curwensville, is married and has seven children.

Hoover is badly wounded, but physicians think he will recover. Downing did not get to the money, and seemed to lose his nerve after he had fired the one shot. He was brought to the Clearfield jail this afternoon.

TRIPLE MURDER AND SUICIDE

Victoria, B. C., June 10.—An account of a triple murder and suicide among the Japanese steamer passengers on the Japanese liner Chikago Maru was related to-day by officers of the vessel, which arrived yesterday. T. Yanagi, jealous, it was said, of K. Kato's attentions to Mrs. Yanagi, shot and killed her and Kato and Mrs. Kato as they slept, and then killed himself. The tragedy occurred on the night of June 3. The bodies were buried at sea.

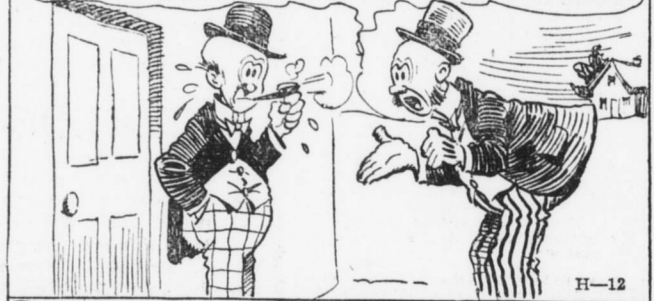

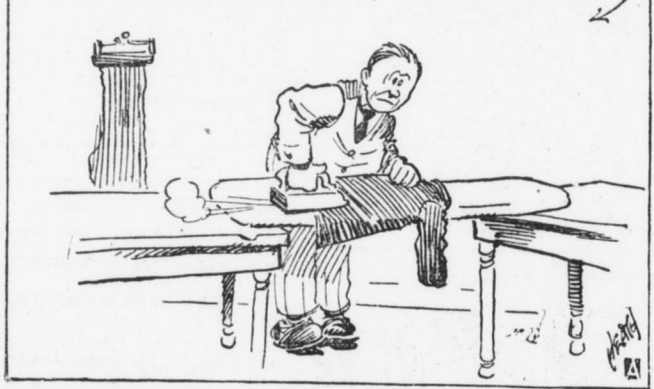

Changes in the pastorates of the Philadelphia A. M. E. Engineer Fraelich was taken ill on the last day he served as a fireman. He caught a severe cold and when called to make his first run as a regular engineer was unable to respond.

CREWS OF SHIPS SAVED

London, June 10.—A dispatch from Amsterdam says a trawler has brought to that port thirty-two sailors—the crew of the Norwegian steamer Erkendal—which was sunk by a mine. A dispatch from Copenhagen says the Swedish bark Heidi has been sunk by a mine. The crew was saved.

TAKE DYES FROM DUTCH

Berlin, June 10 (By Wireless) — The Dutch newspaper Handelsblad says the British compelled the captains of several Dutch steamships to unload aniline dyes in their cargo and before permitting the vessels to proceed to the Dutch Indies, says the Overseas Agency. "These dyes were needed for English industries. Great Britain had promised to let them pass, although they were manufactured in Germany. It is reported the British seek to justify their action by asserting that a former cargo of dyes reached undesirable hands."

ACCEPT GERARD STATEMENT

Berlin, June 9, via London, June 10. — Count Friedrich von Westarp, Conservative leader in the Reichstag, has accepted the statement of the American Ambassador, James W. Gerard, that the interview of the National Zeitung was a fabrication. As a consequence Count Westarp to-day published a statement withdrawing criticisms on the American policy, which he made in the Reichstag and which were based on the alleged interview.

KILL BANDIT LEADER

Chihuahua, June 10. — General Luis Herrera reported to-day from Parral the capture of Victor Sandoval, a notorious bandit leader, in the Providencia valley, together with four companions, one of whom had been shot. Sandoval was shot immediately by his captors and announcement was made that his brother, Luis, now confined in Parral, is to be executed "for the public good."

ASPHALT BALL POSTPONED

The first municipal concert and dance, which was scheduled to be held last night at Front and Boas streets on the pavements, under the auspices of the Social Workers Club, was postponed until next week because of the serious illness of a woman residing in the neighborhood. Several thousand people had gathered to witness the event.

GENERAL ZELAYA HERE

New York, June 10. — General Jose Santos Zelaya, former president of Nicaragua, arrived here to-day on the Spanish steamship Alfonso XIII from Vigo, Spain. He said he had come to the United States to visit relatives. When General Zelaya left here in December, 1913, he was an exile from his own country.
