Because his counsel expects to ask for a new trial, George Moxley, charged with carrying concealed deadly weapons, was not sentenced to-day. John R. Meadowcroft, father of the youth who was in court yesterday, was tried for assault and battery and malicious mischief.

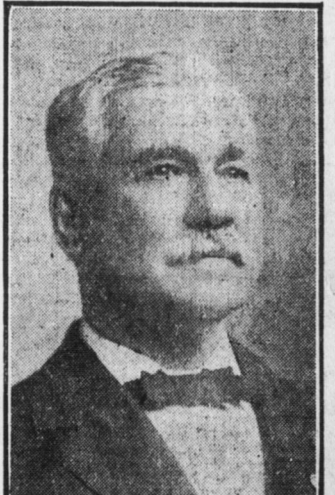

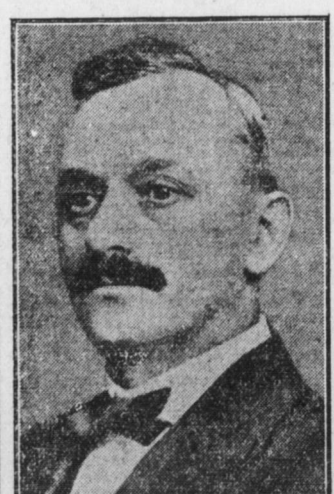

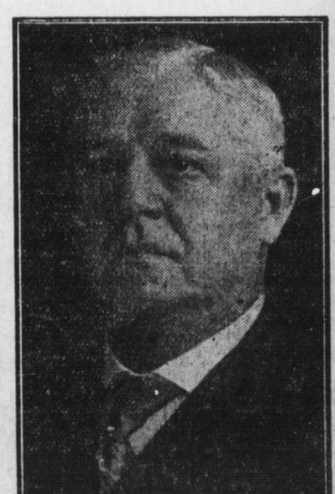
