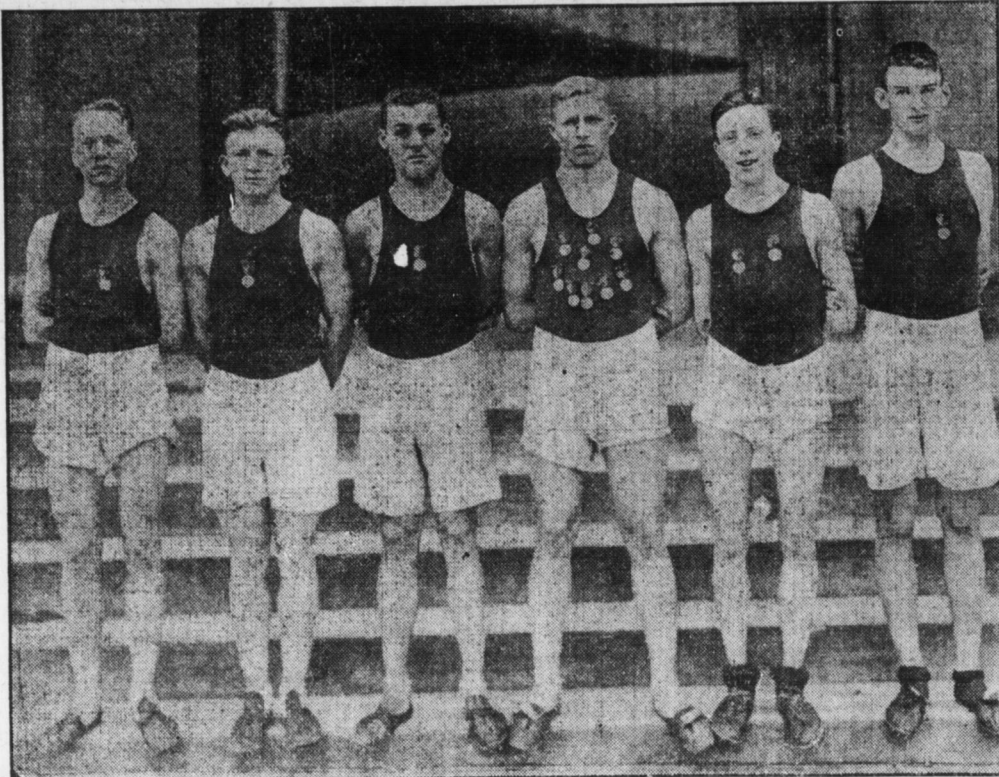


HARRISBURG LOSES TO SYRACUSE
