T. R. ASKS PERMIT TO RAISE ARMY

Division Will Be Complete in All Units; Commanders Chosen

New York, July 10.—Undeterred by signs of peace, Theodore Roosevelt, it was learned yesterday, has made formal application to the War Department for authority to raise a division in the event of hostilities with Mexico.

Son to Be a Captain Benjamin Joy and David H. Goodrich, two graduates of Harvard University, have undertaken to take charge of recruiting in the neighborhood of Boston.

For his brigade commanders Mr. Roosevelt has selected Rear Admiral Cameron McRae Winslow, who will retire on July 29 from the command of the Pacific fleet, and three well-known officers of the regular army.
