An employer is liable for compensation when an employe is injured through condition of premises of the employer according to an opinion rendered today by the State Workmen's Compensation Board, in the case of Peter Dixon, North Barnesboro, against the Tunnel Coaling Co. Saxman. The appeal was taken from the decision of Referee Jacob Snyder, of Blair county, at the instance of the State Workmen's Insurance Fund. The facts were that the claimant had finished work and slipped on ice and fell while on his way home. The fall occurred on the company's property.

**NEWS OF STEELTON CANAL PROBLEM FINDS GIRL HE LOVES AFTER 14 YEARS**

**Comprehensive Sewer System Suggested; to Ask Bids; Meets Opposition**

A definite plan for solving Steelton's drainage problem and for eliminating the old Pennsylvania canal nuisance, against which there has been years of bitter litigation, was presented to council and tentatively adopted last evening.

This plan calls for an intercepting sewer of diameter of six and one-half feet in length of 1,200 feet from Front to the river, with lateral sewers running from Front street south to Locust; from Frederick street north to Locust; from Locust street north and Franklin streets to Front street, and from Front and Conestoga streets north to Eleanor street. These lateral drains range in size from two feet in diameter to six feet. The main sewer, meter, and give adequate capacity for draining the entire borough north and west of Locust street.

**To Obtain Bids**

After a lengthy and thorough discussion of the proposed comprehensive sewer system on third reading to grant the Pennsylvania railroad the right to construct a bridge over the canal, the council on its proposed freight spur into the steel plant, along the canal, it was decided to obtain bids on building this proposed sewer system.

**Would Amend Ordinance**

Before this action is taken, however, councilmen declare the present unsatisfactory ordinance must be amended to contain clauses covering the sewer agreement, to require the grade crossings to be adequately protected and to lengthen the borough—clauses which the measure does not now contain.

**Opposition to the large part of the proposed drainage plan was voiced by Councilmen Obercash, Reich, Shelley and Sellers. Messrs. Obercash and Reich declared that the proposed plan would subject the West Side to drainage of sewage high water, and asked why the sewer was not planned to run along the canal bed, which he asserted was the natural drainage basin.**

**Mr. Reich shared these views and declared that while the council should give consideration in this measure because the establishment of three additional grade crossings of three tracks each will cause West Side real estate to be depreciated, the council should consider the inconvenience and damage to the residents of this section who are forced to cross so many tracks.**

**Mr. McEntee, of the Fourth Ward, took the floor to state that he had pointed out the advantages to the borough that will result from such a comprehensive sewer system for the town. He pointed out that it is imperative that a sewer in the canal bed when the tracks will be built upon its surface, and declared that the borough would be benefited from damage by laying the sewer in the canal bed, which would also point out the increase in flow through a large sewer built by the steel company and now used by the borough in the vicinity of Locust street.**

**Mr. Obercash took exception to some of these arguments and declared, "property owners' in the district which I am talking about are not in favor of so large a sewer in the canal bed. It will be a comeback upon the borough if damage should result from any floods. Why should you make this change in the canal bed, which is satisfactory in the canal basin."**

**REVENUE BILL IS PASSED BY HOUSE**

Removal of Special Bank Tax Feature of Fight; Cut Pay of Tariff Board

Washington, D. C., July 11.—The omnibus bill, raising funds for Governmental expenses from incomes, munitions and inheritances and creating a tariff commission, passed the House late yesterday by the vote of 240 to 140. Thirty-nine Republicans and Progressives and one Independent, Representative Kent, of California, and one Socialist, voted for the measure, and four members, two Republicans and two Democrats, answered "present" when their names were called.

The principal changes in the bill are:

- Reduction of the salaries of the members of the Tariff Commission from \$10,000 to \$7,500 per annum.
- A continuing appropriation of \$300,000 for the salaries of the commission.
- Elimination of the clause prohibiting members of Congress from serving on the commission.
- Removal of the special bank tax of \$1 per \$100 of capital, surplus and undivided profits.

The bill provided that \$1 should be levied for each \$1000 capital, surplus and undivided profits used in any of the following situations:

- Including such sums as may be invested in or loaned upon stocks, bonds, mortgages, real estate or other securities.
- The amendment of Mr. Wood to strike out the clause in the bill providing for the whole house in the vote of 169 to 114. The final result was the adoption of the amendment by a vote of 167.

Berlin, July 11 (by wireless).—The official Austro-Hungarian statement of Monday reports the continuance of heavy fighting on the Italian front.
