Foreign Born Must Stay Loyal Even if Not Pleased With Affairs, Wilson Says

Wathington, July 13. — President Wilson told a citizenship convention here to-day that the American government must insist that foreigners becoming citizens remain loyal even if they are not pleased with the way affairs are conducted. Loyalty means nothing, he declared, unless it is coupled with self-sacrifice. He added that Americans cannot teach loyalty unless they practice it.

The President discussed the problem of Americanizing foreign born citizens. Native-born Americans were warned by the President to examine themselves carefully to see whether they have burning in them the true light of America which they expect to show to these foreigners.


