Big Crowds Attend the Great Moose Carnival

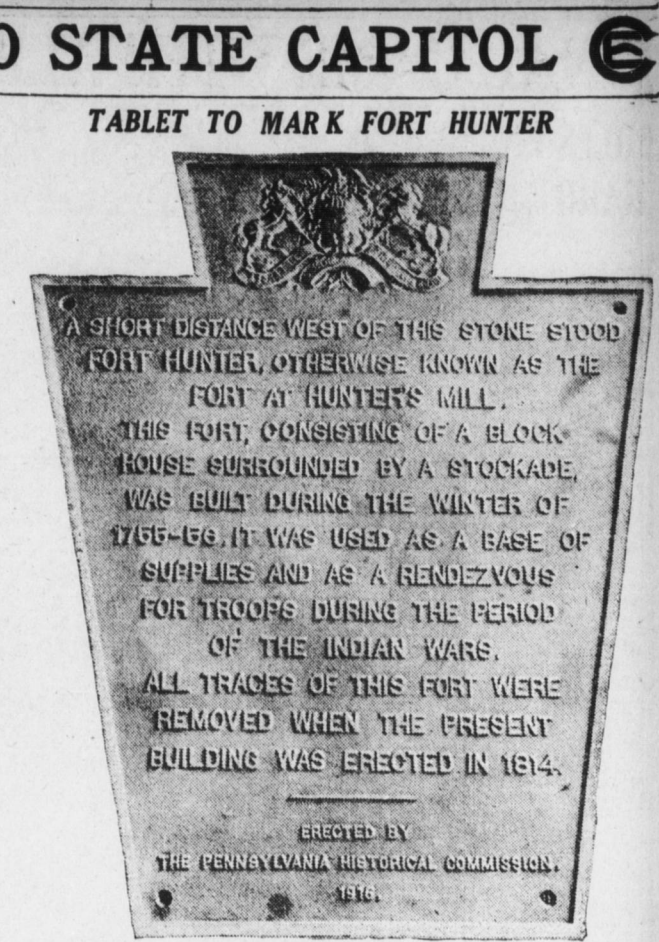

IT WAS USED AS A BASE OF SUPPLIES AND AS A RENDEZVOUS FOR TROOPS DURING THE PERIOD OF THE INDIAN WARS. ALL TRACES OF THIS FORT WERE REMOVED WHEN THE PRESENT BUILDING WAS ERECTED IN 1814.
