It was just a large, all-embracing noise and everyone was in on it.

In the opening song service Chorister Brewster sprang a surprise when he announced the World's Christian Endeavor Anthem as sung at the World's Convention in Chicago last year. This piece, "Blessed Redeemer" was sung by the chorus choir of the Harrisburg C. E. Choral Union. But Brewster was surprised himself when a demand was made from the choir that he sing for them. He could only say, "This is so sudden. You'll have to wait a minute." But he did very well when the intune was up.

The Rev. Dr. J. A. Lyter, of Derry Street U. B. Church, conducted the opening devotion. The Choral Union rendered the anthem of the evening, "Gonna's Sanctus and Benedictus," with Mrs. Roy G. Cox singing the solo part. The orchestral accompaniment was particularly good in this piece.

Amid cheering and applause, the Rev. Geo. A. Long, of Pittsburgh, State Vice-President, who presided, led Chairman Curtis of the General Convention Committee to the platform where he introduced him to the Endeavorers. The Rev. Curtis made a short address about the work of the General Committee.

Chairman Curtis then called the other chairmen to the platform. When he had them lined up for public inspection, the Convention could hardly control its laughter. But he did very well when the intune was up.

# CARD INDEX FOR THE GUARDSMEN

Names and All Data About the Soldiers Will Be Made Up by Adjutant General

A card index of all members of the Pennsylvania National Guard now in the federal service is to be made at the adjutant general's office as soon as the complete rolls are obtained. This will enable the department to keep track of all the men in the Pennsylvania Guard as well as to note their home addresses, next of kin, where they were employed when called into the service and any other information which the State may require.

It will take considerable time to compile the list as not all of the rolls are on file, some of the commanders not having forwarded them to Texas. The index will show the names of men who were stamped either on the call or as recruits, whether they passed the examination and what organizations they left for the border.

# TREVINO'S FORCES SURROUND VILLA

Outlaws in Bad Shape; De Facto Commander Reiterates Loyalty

Chihuahua City, Mex., July 15.—General Matias Ramos, director of the government forces operating against Villista bandits in Southern Chihuahua, is redesigning his troops preparatory to a quick attack in an effort to break the outlaws' power in that section. General Jacinto Trevino, military commander of the Northeast, made this announcement.

### All Gangers Past

Following an inspection trip to Rosario he dispatched heavy reinforcements from General Ramos' garrison. General Ramos reported that he was moving these troops "with a view to future operations against general Jacinto Trevino at Rosario is necessary because of the heavy losses suffered by the Carranzista forces at Corralitos, San Salvador and Cerro Blanco."

### Trevino Reasserts Loyalty

A declaration that he and all other members of the Carranza government are mutually united with the firm determination of establishing order in Mexico was made by General Jacinto Trevino, military commander of the Northeast.

### There are contemptible persons who wish to see trouble continue in Mexico," said the general's announcement. "These are as bad, in their own way, as Villa and his gang of cutthroats. They want to stir up animosity between Mexico and the United States."

### Does anyone think that I or any other prominent supporter of the government would be so extremely foolish as to start a civil war at this time when, after all our mutual hard work, we have at last dominated the country and can look forward soon to an unexampled era of peace and hitherto unknown era of prosperity for which we all so honestly long?

### Meanwhile United

"The Villa bandits are pursuing the rest until we have destroyed them," General Trevino said the fact that he was actively prosecuting the campaign against the bandits and that three Villa officers and the General La Manga had been executed at Camargo ought to show that he was not engaged in any coalition with the bandits.

### Reports received show that the main body of the bandits has worked southward from Sombretillo. Pursuing them are four columns of Carranzista forces.

### General Trevino explained the fact that he was actively prosecuting the campaign against the bandits and that three Villa officers and the General La Manga had been executed at Camargo ought to show that he was not engaged in any coalition with the bandits.

### The commander of the Northeast district does not believe the Villistas have enough equipped to wage a hard campaign. He declares that before they took Jimenez that the bandits obtained only food.
