Mount Union, Pa., July 29.—Owing to delays in the shipping of materials for building purposes, the Sternbach Construction Company has notified the school board that it will be impossible to have the new high school building completed by September 4, the date set for the opening of the high school. The board of education is now up against a hard proposition as there are only ten rooms available in the town. The county is needed. 100,000 QUARTS OF MILK SENT IN ONE DAY

As much as 100,000 quarts of milk has been received in a single day.
