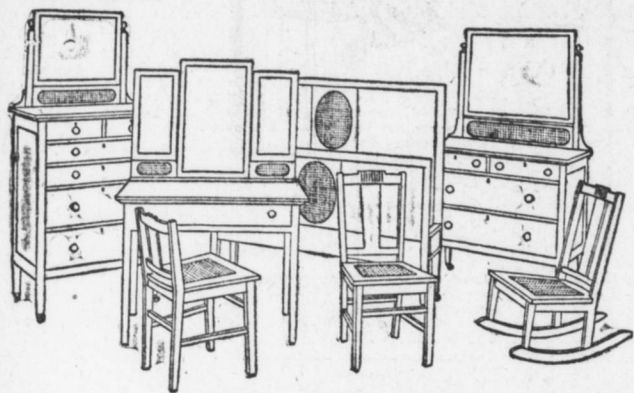

FAVORS PENSION FOR MINISTERS

Governor Brumbaugh Endorses Annuity Fund Being Raised by Methodist Church

"I am greatly interested in the Endowment Fund for the support of the worn-out veteran preachers and those who are dependent upon them," declares Governor Brumbaugh in a letter to Rev. C. W. Karns, secretary of the Annuity Fund of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Carlisle, Pa. Governor Brumbaugh continues "surely no more self-sacrificing, underpaid servants of the Master work for him in this world. They deserve comfort and care and are dependent upon them." The Lord bless you, bless those that give, and those that need the fund.

Secretary Karns, speaking of this campaign, under the auspices of the Central Pennsylvania Annual Conference for pensions for preachers, said: "The Central Pennsylvania Annual Conference at its 1911 session decided to begin an aggressive campaign in the interest of the Annuity Fund. The present secretary was at that time appointed to this task."
"The Methodist Church has 2750 retired ministers, and more than 3050 widows and 500 orphans. We pay the ministers and widows approximately \$125 annually. We need \$10,000,000 invested at 5 per cent. to give these veterans even a meager support."
