GIBSON KENIGS ON GIANTS By Associated Press Pittsburgh, Pa., Aug. 19. — George Gibson, veteran catcher who was re-leased last Tuesday by the Pittsburgh National League Baseball Club, an-nounced last night that he will not join the New York Giants. He pre-pared to-day to return to his home in London, Ont. Gibson claims that the local club violated a gentleman's agreement in declining to declare him a free agent. Barney Dreyfuss, Presi-dent of the Pittsburgh Pirates, asserts, however, that he is powerless to grant him an unconditional release as the Giants refused to waive claim to the catcher's services. 
