

The army officers who made the investigation recommended Fort Kamehameha as the best site for aviation headquarters. General Evansiplan, if carried out, will mean, it is said, the establishment here of the largest United States aerial research stations. Co-operation of the Weather Bureau with the military authorities is planned.
