Men Must Arbitrate or Strike, Rea's Stand

Washington, D. C., Aug. 23,-amuel Rea, president of the Penn-lvania Railroad Company, made statement yesterday regarding te strike situation, in which he id:

For the management of the For the management of the railways to yield to the de-mands and threats of the la-bor organizations, and to ac-cept President Wilson's pro-posal would be to destroy the principle of arbitration as the paramount and recognized method of settling labor dis-putes.

The threatened strike would be postponed, it is true, but we would have no assurance that it would be permanently pre-vented. Except that the principle of an eight-hour pay day would be conceded, the issues of the very controversy now pending would be left unsettled, while the future of the railways would be rendered dark and uncertain indeed. These, in brief, are the real-ways, with a full appreciation of the solenn and weighty re-sponsibility resting on them, as well as of their duty to the pub-lic and to their shareholders, have been forced to the conclu-sion that it is better to face the alternative of a strike than to surrender.


