Boston, Mass., Aug. 30. — Plans to insure an adequate food supply for this city in case of a general railroad strike goes into effect Labor Day were discussed to-day by Mayor Curley with officers of trolley companies, the Health Commissioner, the Street Commissioner and the superintendent of markets.

St. Louis, Aug. 30. — An embargo on all perishable freight products and livestock for the entire city of St. Louis will be placed on the receipt of all perishable freight and livestock which cannot reach destination before September 3.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 30. — The Northern Pacific Railroad to-day declared an embargo on perishable freight and livestock that would not reach its destination by Saturday, September 2.

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 30. — An embargo will be placed on all perishable freight by the Rocking Valley Railroad, it was announced at the offices here to-day.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 30. — Notices that an embargo on all classes of freight would be issued within forty-eight hours to issue an embargo against the acceptance of all classes of freight.

Pittsburgh Shippers to Send Munitions to Lake Erie by Motor Trucks

Pittsburgh, Aug. 30. — All railroads entering the Pittsburgh district were busy to-day completing arrangements, begun a week or more ago, for handling business in case of a strike.

HIRING STRIKE-BREAKERS

Savannah, Ga., Aug. 30. — L. W. Baldwin, general manager of the Central of Georgia Railroad, last night issued a bulletin requesting applications for positions from engineers and trainmen to replace strikers in the event of a walk out.

Philadelphia, Aug. 30. — Officials of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Baltimore and Ohio and Reading Railroad said here to-day that no embargo on freight shipments would be made by any of these lines unless as a part of a general plan agreed upon by all of the roads in the country which will be affected by the threatened strike next Monday.

It was explained that the three systems entering this city would be able by Tuesday to operate the fast freight, carrying food supplies, and all milk trains. The officials were optimistic over the possibility of running sufficient trains on the first day of the strike, should one occur.

NO EMBARGO BY P. R. R.; EXPECTS TO HAVE FOOD TRAINS MOVING TUESDAY

In the event of the strike order becoming effective on Monday, an adequate but limited schedule of both freight and passenger trains can be established by Wednesday, officials asserted.
