Samples of the ore have been sent to the United States geologist, the State geologist and chief chemist of a steel company in Johnstown. Each analysis showed 17 to 20 per cent. pure copper. As a result of the discovery, several farms already have changed hands and agents are busy trying to get leases on others. Local capital is being invested and getting control. New Baltimore, in Somerset county, is twelve miles from a railroad, and if the copper ore is found in large deposits it will be necessary to build a railroad to take care of the development.
