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TROUT PLANTING IS NOW UNDER WAY

Almost a Quarter of a Million Fish Have Been Put Out Within a Month



Pennsylvania State fishery authorities have begun the Fall planting of trout in the streams of the State and it is estimated that the department will be in charge that approximately 3,000,000 yearling trout will be distributed between September 1 and April 15.

Census Figures.—The State department of Labor and Industry has issued a series of figures summarizing the industrial situation in this State in the last five years, which shows the big expansion in operations, employees and wages.

Accuse Road Men.—A Hazleton dispatch says: charges of irregularities in connection with State Highway repair work in the Hazleton district were preferred to-day by Joseph Hoffman and Benjamin Simms, of Butler Valley, discharged workmen against Samuel Kemp and H. E. Miller, of Swoyersville, in charge of the job. Miller is the foreman and Kemp his assistant. Both deny the charges. The State Highway Department at Harrisburg has been notified by Hoffman.
