New Jersey Wins Team Trophy; J. G. Martin Leads Harrisburgers

Atlantic City, Sept. 14.—President J. G. Martin of the Harrisburg Sportsmen's Association lead the Dauphin county shooters yesterday. He broke 197 out of 175. H. B. Shoop was second with 166. Other Harrisburg scores were: S. S. Hoffman, 163; W. S. Horn, 162; Eshenour, 150; West Fairview, M. B. Stewart, 156; W. E. Hoover, 136.

New Jersey brought an upset in triumphing in the State championship in the field of nine teams at the annual tournament of the Westy Hogans. The victorious Jersey squad broke 484 in forging to the front over accredited strong teams. New York State, champions last season, followed with three targets in the rear. Pennsylvania and Ohio tied for third position.
