to Make Certain Detroit Branch

**NOT VERY LARGE** 

Philadelphia, Sept. 16. — Setting at rest many conjectures in financial circles regarding the Pennsylvania Railroad's outlay in extending the lines to Detroit, Samuel Rea, its president, in a formal statement yesterday said that by using portions of existing facilities the cost of the project would be considerably under \$10,000,000. Not only will the ennsylvania be able to handle freight in and out of the Michigan center by the extension of its lines, but through a working agreement with the Wabash and Pere Marquette railroads it will be able to handle passenger service, the present termin-als being used for that purpose.
