Millersburg, Pa., Sept. 22. — Captain William C. Mills, a veteran of the Civil War died suddenly of heart disease yesterday at his home in Lenkerville, aged 77 years. Mr. Mills came to Lenkerville from Chester county after the war and for many years followed milling. During the war he was a member of the crew of the warship Cumberland, and was one of the crew who escaped when rammed by the Merrimac in Hampton Roads. He also witnessed the battle between the Merrimac and the Monitor after the destruction of his ship. He is survived by two sons, William, Jr., of Millersburg and Harry F., of Hazleton and four daughters, Mrs. Annie Noble and Mrs. H. H. Heicher, of Harrisburg; Mrs. Wm. H. Goodwin of West Chester and Miss Sue at home.
