They are now making for a revision of the system which will also give them bishops of their own race. The general convention of 1913, which met in New York, appointed a strong commission of bishops, clergy and laymen to consider this question. The commission, of which the bishop of North Carolina is chairman, has just issued its report. This will be discussed at the convention to be held at St. Louis in October.
