Allies Protest Seizure of Bank Assets in Mexico

Washington, D. C., Oct. 3.—Strong protest has been made to the State Department by the British and French embassies against the action of the Carranza government in Mexico City in seizing the assets of British and French banking institutions in the Mexican capital.

These banks are closed as the result of the Carranza decrees and it is declared that the interests of British and French stockholders have been seriously affected. Because French financial interests in the banks are much larger than the British, France has taken the lead in the protests, but the British embassy has notified the State Department that it is in full sympathy with them.

So far the State Department has given no indication of what it will do, but it is believed that the protests will be transmitted first to the American members of the joint commission now in session at Atlantic City to be drawn to the attention of their Mexican colleagues.

Fifty or sixty shots were fired. The slain man was "Peggy" O'Day, a saloonkeeper. Daniel Hartman, one of O'Day's companions, was shot through the lungs. According to the story told the police by Samuel Harris, owner of the roadhouse. Hartman had offered to "sell" him a woman and there had been a dispute over the price. O'Day and Hartman, with two associates, all heavily armed, drove up to the roadhouse in an automobile and attacked the proprietor and two waiters, Harris said.

RUMANIANS SERIOUS MENACE TO MACKENSEN

[Continued from First Page]

Mackensen's left flank and might easily force his retirement from the present front south of the Constanza-Tchernavoda railway. He already is being subjected to heavy pressure along this line by the Russians and Rumanians, presumably in connection with the flanking operation.

The latest statement from Sofia minimizes the importance of the Rumanian invasion, mentioning the invading force as consisting of "several Lattalions" conveyed across the river in boats between Rustchuk and Turtukai. "Measures have been taken to attack this force," the official bulletin declares.

Tide of Battie Swings

In Macedonia where as elsewhere in the eastern war theater the allies are pressing offensive movements presumably to prevent reinforcements being sent by the central powers from one field of activity to another, the tide of battle is fluctuating on both wings.

The Serbians appear to have gained the upper hand in the hilly Kaimakalan region. Sofia admits a Bulgarian retirement there and the French official report announces a new advanced

lan region. Sofia admits a Bulgarian retirement there and the French official report announces a new advance by the Serbians, who have captured first line trenches and taken another Bugarian battery.

Entrente statements declare the Bulgarians were repulsed in the eastern end of the Macedonian front, in attacks on British positions east of the Struma. Sofia, however, reports the capture by Bulgarian forces of the villages of Jenikoi and Nevolyen, which the British had taken.

Counter Attacks Repulsed
On the Somme front a period of determined counter attacks by the Germans appear to have set in. They have been striking back strongly at the British along the Pozieres—Bapaume road, working their way back into the village of Eaucourt L'Abbaye and to-day they are reported by Paris to have attempted heavy strokes, at the French lines near Rancourt, north of Peronne.
